- St. Augustine Light House and Museum The Light House was a U.S. Coast Guard training base during World War II. The Museum includes a history of the Coast Guard training.
- Castillo de San Marco The Spanish built the Castillo to defend the Florida coast and protect their trade routes; the Castillo is the oldest masonry fort in America.
- Spanish Military Hospital Museum An introduction to the practice of medicine in the Spanish period. The Spanish Military Hospital was established in 1791 in honor of King Charles IV of Spain during the Second Spanish Period. In addition to being a hospital, the building also had a mourning room that allowed families to grieve over their deceased soldier for 24 hours. Now, the hospital has been turned into a museum by Barbara and Nicholas Wilson who have kept the ground floor and garden in the same way that they would have been during the years of the hospital's operation.
- Annual Meeting and Dinner at the Spanish Military Hospital Museum Speakers: Christine P. Miller, D.P.M., D.M.M., Ph.D., FACCWS, is the museum's Volunteer Medical Historian. CAMP Director Dr. Miller is a University of Florida assistant professor of orthopaedic surgery and a podiatrist and board-certified wound care specialist at UF Health Jacksonville. She also serves as medical director of the Wound Healing/Limb Salvage Program. In addition to Dr. Miller's talk, Vincent Piraino will give a short presentation on musket ballistics.

- Fort Clinch Fort Clinch was a Costal Defense fort that protected the entrance to the St. Marys River, and the harbor in St. Marys, Georgia. Union troops occupied the Fort during the Civil War, and Coast Guardsmen served at the Fort in WWI and WWII.
- Point Peter Located in St. Marys, Georgia, Point Peter was a long-standing battery located on the St. Marys River. Following the Battle of New Orleans, the British took the battery at Point Peter – a battle fought after the War of 1812 was officially over.
- Travel on to St. Simons Island, Georgia Using the Route 17 exit from I-95, the group will pass Jekyll Island (the Newport, Rhode Island of the rich and famous in the south) and the site of the J.A. Jones Shipyard where Liberty Ships were constructed during World War II.
- Home Front Museum, St. Simons Island, Georgia Located in a former U.S. Coast Guard station, the Home Front Museum provides details of World War II in Coastal Georgia. Navy schools, a Liberty Ship yard and antisubmarine patrols are featured in the Museum displays.
- Fort Frederica Following a surprise attack on Savannah in 1735, James Olgethorpe built and staffed several outposts in disputed (by the Spanish and the British) territory. The largest of these was Fort Frederica on St. Simons Island. A small town was located adjacent to the Fort, and the residents built a thriving agricultural and merchant market. The CAMP tour will visit the NPS visitor center and then tour the remains of the village and Fort.
- Battle of Bloody Marsh This battle took place on 7 July 1742 when the Spanish tried to take Fort Frederica on. The British defeated the Spanish who then retreated to St. Augustine. There were two sharp engagements in the battle, and the group will visit both sites.
- Fort King George Traveling north from St. Simons Island on Route 17, enter Darien. Observe the tabby wall remains of warehouses fired by a Union raid in June 1863 (before Sherman's march). Proceed on to the site of Fort King George. Fort King George was built in 1721 on the Darien River; the Fort was the southernmost British fort until 1727. The CAMP tour will visit a recreation of the Fort.

Camp Blanding Museum – Camp Blanding, originally a Florida National Guard training post, was mobilized for federal service in 1940. Initially a unit training site (152 different units trained at the Post), the Post was converted to an Infantry Replacement Training Center (IRTC) in the summer of 1943. Just over 824,000 men trained at Camp Blanding during World War II. The Post returned to the State of Florida in 1948 and remains a primary training site for multiple Regular, Reserve and National Guard units. The Museum displays the history of the Post and the World War II training effort. Equipment from World War II through the Gulf Wars is displayed.
